Chicano Park Tour

Building on the AAR's theme focused on "creating, redefining, and expanding spheres of public discourse," this tour engages San Diego's Chicano Park and its mural paintings. In 1970, Chicano Park emerged through the efforts of community activists responding to the



fracture and displacement of Chicano/a/x communities caused by the construction of the Interstate 5 freeway in the barrio of Logan Heights. On this freeway's pillars, Chicano Park displays one of the largest assemblages of public murals in North America inspired by Chicano/a/x history. The park

has been an important site for cohesion and celebration but also of conflict and resistance.

In 2018, the San Diego Tribune described the space as a "battleground" for cultural identity between right wing groups waving American flags and Chicano/a/x groups waving flags of Aztlan. Join us for a tour and discussion of religion and the city in San Diego's Chicano Park.

The bus will depart and return to the Convention Center.


Chinese Historical Museum and Garden Walking Tour



This docent-led tour provides an overview of the history of San Diego's Chinatown, the Chuang Garden, our permanent collection, and featured exhibits in the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Memorial Extension and Chuang Archive and Learning Center.

Participants will meet at the Chinese Historical Museum. The museum is a 4 minute walk to and from the Convention Center. Directions from the Convention Center are: 1) start out going southeast on W Harbor Dr toward 1st Ave. 2) turn left onto 1st Ave. 3) turn right onto walkway 4) proceed east through Marina Linear Park 5) Turn right onto J St 6) Turn left onto 3Rd Ave. 7) San Diego Chinese Historical Museum, 404 3RD AVE is on the left.

Historical Gaslamp Walking Tour



Opening a window to San Diego's past, the Gaslamp Quarter Historical Foundation Walking Tour showcases the history of the Gaslamp Quarter by focusing on the stories behind the stately Victorian Buildings that dot the district. Each tour includes admission and a guided tour the Davis-Horton House, the oldest standing edifice in the district, once home to San Diego Founding Father Alonzo Horton. The House was also used as a county hospital, a boarding house, and a military barracks. Tours last approximately 90 minutes and are about a half a mile walk.

Participants will meet at the Gaslamp Museum at the Davis-Horton House approximately 7 minutes away from the Convention Center. The directions to the Gaslamp Museum from the Convention Center are: 1) start out going southeast on W Harbor Dr toward 1st Ave. 2) turn left onto 1st Ave. 3) turn right onto Island Ave. 4) turn right onto 4th Ave 5) turn left onto Island Ave. 6) end at 410 Island Avenue, San Diego, CA 92101.



Highlights at the San Diego Art Museum

Start your day at the San Diego Art Museum with a one hour, decent-led tour of the Renaissance and Baroque, Asian, Persian, and the Art of the Americas galleries. The Museum's collections are all

encompassing, with objects from across the globe, and ranging in date from 5,000 B.C. to the present. Perhaps best known for its Spanish old master paintings, the Museum holds a broad collection of European, American, Latin American, and Asian Art. Among the most important aspect of the Museum's holdings in Asian art are the world-class South Asian paintings from the

encyclopedic collection of Edwin Binney III; Buddhist sculpture of China and Japan; Ukiyo-e woodblock prints; and a wide variety of ceramics, metalwork, and decorative arts ranging in date from about 1,600 BCE until the present-day. The European collection also holds strong groups of paintings ranging from the Renaissance and Baroque eras to Impressionism and Post-Impressionism. Recently, the Museum has made significant acquisitions of contemporary art and photography, and of art from Africa, Oceania, and the indigenous peoples of the Americas. You will have ample time to explore the museum on your own after the tour.

Balboa Park

Balboa Park began as 1400 acres of land set aside in 1868 by San Diego civic leaders. Known then as “City Park”, the scrub-filled mesa that overlooked present day Downtown San Diego sat without formal landscaping or development for more than 20 years. (Today the Park's total land parcel has been reduced to 1,200 acres.)

The first steps in Park beautification were made in 1892, largely due to the contributions of Kate Sessions. Sessions offered to plant 100 trees a year within the Park as well as donate trees and shrubs around San Diego in exchange for 32 acres of land within the Park boundaries to be used for her commercial nursery.

Several popular species, including the birds of paradise, queen palm and poinsettia were introduced into the Park's horticulture because of Sessions' early efforts. In fact, many of her original trees are alive and visible today. It is no wonder that Kate Sessions earned the title “The Mother of Balboa Park” at the 1935 California Pacific International Exposition.

Sacred Sites Tour

David R. Bains, Samford University & Daniel Sack, National Endowment for the Humanities, Presiding



San Diego is noted for its early Spanish missions, the exotic buildings of its world's fairs in Balboa Park (1915-16, 1935-26), and its embrace of twentieth-century modernist architecture. This bus tour will examine these themes as it explores several historic religious sites. The oldest of our planned stops is the Mission Basilica San Diego de Alcalá founded in 1769 as the first Spanish mission in California. It was

rebuilt in 1931 to its 1813 appearance and began operating as a parish church in 1941. We will also visit the stunning modernist First United Methodist Church (1964), which incorporates an exterior garden as devotional focal point. Additional stops should include St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral (1951), a Gothic revival church designed by Philip Frohman, supervising architect of Washington National Cathedral. We will also visit Bertram Goodhue's campus for the 1915 Panama-California Exposition. Its architecture established a sumptuous revival of Spanish colonial architecture. The fair's exhibits united modern innovations with exotic presentations of cultures and religion.

The bus will depart and return to the Convention Center.

San Diego Zoo

The San Diego Zoo is the world's foremost zoological facility and is known for its extensive collection of flora and fauna.

Guests can explore the Zoo and visit new and innovative exhibits, trademarks of the San Diego Zoo. Opening summer 2009, the Zoo's largest and most complex exhibit to date, Elephant Odyssey! Take a journey back in time to discover what animals lived in Southern California 10,000 years ago, then meet their living counterparts, including elephants, lions, jaguars, tapirs, pronghorns and California condors. See what a tar pit excavation is like, size yourself up against a mammoth, and meet a group of Asian elephants!



Up to four hours free time at the zoo and Balboa Park. The bus will depart and return to the Convention Center.
